New working group: Wind Power in British Columbia

BC Hydro recently approved nine new wind projects that will increase the province's electricity supply by 8%. The projects are expected to generate nearly 5,000 gigawatt hours of electricity per year, enough to power 500,000 homes. The projects are expected to be completed by 2031. At the same time, B.C. Energy Minister Adrian Dix says all future wind projects in the province will be exempt from environmental assessment while "ensuring that First Nations' interests and environmental mitigation are protected and maintained."

BC Nature has concerns about the environmental assessment exemptions, the placement of wind farms, and the mortality to birds and bats that accompany their operation. We are looking for members to form a working group to examine pros, cons and mitigation for wind farms planned for British Columbia.

The work entails doing research and bringing facts to the group for compilation. There is so much information available on line and in print that it is too much for any one person, and so we would like to spread the load.

The final report of the working group will factually address the issues and make recommendations to BC Hydro and the provincial government.

The latest tips on Charting a Course for Tomorrow: *Thoughts on how to energize your club*



This time our idea is: Get your name out there.

There are numerous ways that you can get your group's name into the media, be it online, print or whatever. Here's a couple to think about:

If your club participates in the Christmas Bird Count, Swan and Eagle Count, a bioblitz, etc. have someone write up a story — before or after the event — and send it

to your local newspaper, online news media, or radio station. Be sure to include your contact info, along with an invitation for people to contact your club. Here is a great example: From Castanet: <u>Bird count for kids a success</u> South Okanagan Naturalists' Club (Photo A. Bodden)

A second idea: If your group looks after a trail of bluebird nesting boxes, put a tag or sign on each box with your club's contact info. A QR code is a good thing to include.

Always make sure people know that you welcome them to check you out and to get involved.
